GOVERNOR'S 14-DAY TRAVEL QUARANTINE

(As of March 23, 2020)

Q: What does Governor David Ige's "Order for Self-Quarantine" do?

A: Beginning on **Thursday, March 26**, all persons - including returning residents - entering the state will be required to self-quarantine for fourteen days. Self-quarantined individuals are not permitted to visit any public spaces, including but not limited to pools, meeting rooms, fitness centers, or restaurants. Self-quarantined individuals may only leave their designated locations for medical emergencies or to seek medical care.

Q: Where will self-quarantined individuals be required to go?

A: Returning residents are required to self-quarantine at their residence. Visitors will be required to self-quarantine in their hotel room or rented lodging.

Q: Will visitors entering the state be required to remain here for fourteen days if their planned stay was shorter?

A: No. The self-quarantine will last for fourteen days or the duration of a person's stay, whichever is shorter.

Q: Does this affect people already in Hawai'i or who enter before March 26?

A: No. The self-quarantine will apply only to people entering the state on March 26 or later.

Q: Is anyone exempt from the self-quarantine order?

A: Yes. People who are entering Hawai'i to work on the emergency response or on critical infrastructure are exempt from the order. In addition, Adjutant General Kenneth S. Hara, Director of the Hawai'i Emergency Management Agency, may grant exemptions on a case-by-case basis.

Q: How will the government keep track of people who are subject to self-quarantine order?

A: Persons on flights entering Hawai'i are required to fill out agricultural declaration forms that asks them for their contact information and the address where they will be staying. The Hawai'i Emergency Management Agency will use this information to keep track of quarantined persons.

Q: Will the state pay for or provide the accommodations, transportation, or food necessary for quarantined persons?

A: No. Quarantined persons will be required to secure and pay for these expenses themselves.

Q: What entity will be enforcing the self-quarantine order?

A: County police departments are being asked to enforce the self-quarantine orders and cite violators as needed.

Q: How will anyone know whether a visitor is violating their self-quarantine order?

A: Hotels are being asked to cooperate with the monitoring of visitors who are subject to self-quarantine orders.

Q: Are there penalties for violating the self-quarantine order?

A: Yes. Upon conviction, a person could face a fine of up to \$5,000, up to one year in jail, or both.
